Expository Text

Objective

Students will analyze, make inferences, and draw conclusions about an expository text.

Materials

- Expository text
- Elements and Features of Expository Text handout
- Expository Text Activity handout

Overview

Provide explicit instruction with modeling before having students practice independently or in groups. This activity may be done over several days.

Activity

- 1. Distribute the text and the handouts.
- 2. Discuss with students the information and examples on the Elements and Features of Expository Text handout. Students need to know these terms to complete the activity.
- 3. Explain the directions on the Expository Text Activity handout.
- **4.** Have students complete the handout. Provide scaffolding as needed.

Elements of Expository Text

Element	Description	Examples
Topic	The overall subject of a text—the "who" or "what" the text is about	FriendshipBravery
Main Idea	A statement that tells the most important point in the text	 Charlotte saves Wilbur's life by convincing the farmer not to slaughter him. Zachary Raffles overcomes his fears to become a soldier.
Supporting Details	Help the reader better understand the main idea	 Charlotte writes letters to the farmer about what a good pig Wilbur is. Zachary Raffles stands guard all night at lookout rock.
Facts	 Pieces of information that are indisputably true Pigs are omnivores; they eat plants meat. A soldier serves in an army. 	
Inference	A conclusion reached on the basis of evidence and reasoning	Charlotte enjoys having Wilbur around as a friend.Being a soldier is important to Zachary.
Cause	Why something happened	It started to rain.I slipped on spilled milk.
Effect	What actually happened	The girl was soaked.I fell on the floor.
Cause- and-Effect Statement	A sentence that puts a cause and effect together	When it started to rain, the girl was soaked.I slipped on spilled milk and fell on the floor.



Features of Expository Text

Feature	Description
Heading	A title at the beginning of a page, chapter, or section of text
Subheading	A title at the beginning of a subsection within a main section
Bold text	A word or phrase emphasized through darkened text
Italics text	A word or phrase emphasized through italicized text
Table of contents	A list of the parts in the text and where they are located
Photo or illustration	A picture
Caption	A brief explanation of an illustration
Diagram	Shows information in a graphic organizer
Chart or graph	Shows data
Map	Shows an area, such as land or sea, and its features, such as roads, cities, or states
Glossary	An alphabetical list of vocabulary terms
Index	An alphabetical list of names, places, and topics in a text with the page numbers where they are located; usually at the end of a text
