I love rocks, and I love to collect rocks.




Some rocks are too big to carry home.

Sometimes they give me things that are not rocks.




A brick can be made of rocks of different sizes, but bricks are not rocks.

I have rocks of many different colors.




Granite can be many colors.

I have rocks with spots and sparkle.




Snowflake obsidian has white spots.

I have rocks that feel smooth.





My uncle gave me this rock. It is smooth because it has been tumbled.

Most of my rocks fit in my hand, but rocks can be different sizes.




Boulders are big rocks.
